Course Description:

Although U.S. Latinx Studies is beginning to find a more secure foothold in universities, U.S. Afro-Latinx Studies is still relatively new. In this course, we will examine how *Afro-Latinas/os born and/or raised in the United States* negotiate a complex race, class, and gender identity through representations in both United States literature and United States (popular) culture. We will be looking as well to the roles African-heritage peoples play in countries like Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, and the Dominican Republic, and how such roles affect the histories of their negotiations with racialized identities in the United States.

Course Requirements: Three in-class essay exams (75% of final grade) and 6 reading quizzes 25% of final grade).

GRADING:

Grading is done on a point scale. Each assignment will be worth a possible 12 points (an A). Always make sure that you check the grading scale below; a 7 or 8, for example, does NOT mean a failing grade.

A= excellent; unusually outstanding; good writing (one or less writing errors per page) and original thinking: that is, thinking critically beyond what you have read and discussed in class. You use reading and class discussion, as well as other sources if needed, to back up your ideas so that you are not just giving an opinion but an informed argument. You think of yourself as a writer interested in her ideas and interested in sharing them.

B= above average; only a few (**on average, two or so per page**) writing errors, a standard (not original) argument for the subject, though you should work harder on contributing your own ideas about the subject.

C= average based on general class performance; several writing errors (on average, 3-4 per page); you understand the subject, but you tend to repeat and/or merely summarize what has already been said in the readings or in class discussion.

D= below average; you have not paid attention to the subject and/or you have enough writing errors that your argument cannot be followed.

 \mathbf{F} = incomplete or failing to meet the requirements of the assignment.

Three exams @ 12 points each=36 points: 6 quizzes @ five points each.

Exams: Each exam will be in-class (on Thursdays, our long day), open book, open notes. I will give you 5-8 long exam questions, on **one** of which you will choose to write. You will have the entire class time to write the exam.

These exams should constitute **at least** five **well-written** paragraphs: an introduction, three or more paragraphs of analysis, and a conclusion.

I will have a space on Canvas for you to upload your typewritten exam. If you don't wish to write your exam on your laptop, you can bring 2-3 Blue Books to class in which to write. However, if you choose this option you need to be careful that your handwriting is legible.

Reading Quizzes: Each quiz will be 5 true/false questions.
