Course Description

For students who want to write fiction. Includes basics and heavy reading. Students write stories and their fiction is discussed in workshop.

This course is going to be structured, as is typical, around workshops. However, we will also be reading 2 novellas and a couple of book reviews.

Prerequisites

Prereq: ENC 1101 or test score equivalency.

General Education Designation: Composition (C)

Communication courses afford students the ability to communicate effectively, including the ability to write clearly and engage in public speaking. **Composition (C)** is a sub-designation of Communication at the University of Florida. Composition courses provide instruction in the methods and conventions of standard written English (i.e. grammar, punctuation, usage) and the techniques that produce effective texts. Composition courses are writing intensive, require multiple drafts submitted to the instructor for feedback prior to final submission, and fulfill 6,000 of the university's 24,000-word writing requirement. Course content must include multiple forms of effective writing, different writing styles, approaches and formats, and methods to adapt writing to different audiences, purposes and contexts. Students are expected learn to organize complex arguments in writing using thesis statements, claims and evidence, and to analyze writing for errors in logic.

III. Graded Work

Graded Components

Midterm Paper (50%%): You will write a review in line with the essays we will read as a class. This review will be in response to either a piece of fiction we have read or a piece from one of your classmates. 1500 Words

Workshop Responses (20%%): You will write a 150-word discussion post in response to each of your classmates' pieces. Additionally, you will write a 100-word post in response to someone else's discussion post. If you fail to respond to more than 5 stories you will receive a zero for this portion of your grade. You may respond 3 days after the workshop date at the latest.

Story Revisions (10%%): You will submit a revised version of your submitted story based on the feedback you received from myself and your peers. You will produce a 500 word write up detailing the changes you've made.

Story (10%%): A 2500 Word short story or excerpt of a longer work to be workshopped in class. Due One Week before your workshop date.

Critical Responses (10%%): 300 Word write ups/reviews in response to the Two Novellas I've assigned.
