## **Course Description:**

In this class, we will read poems, write about poems, and compose poems of our own. The course will begin with an introduction to and intensive study of various aspects of poetry and verse-form, to include written critical analyses covering a wide range of poems. After week seven, we will also begin drafting, workshopping, and revising our own original poems.

By the end of this course, students will be expected to have a foundation in the vocabulary of poetic devices, structures, and forms, and to be able to read and talk about poetry in an academic setting. Students will be expected to conduct themselves as productive members of a creative writing workshop, and to demonstrate a sincere and honest attempt to develop their own writing practice.

#### **COVID Statement:**

# **General Education Objectives:**

This course confers General Education credit for Composition (C), and also fulfills 6,000 of the university's 24,000-word writing requirement (WR).

• Composition courses provide instruction in the methods and conventions of standard written English (grammar, punctuation, usage), as well as the techniques that produce effective texts. Composition courses are writing intensive. They require multiple drafts submitted to your instructor for feedback before final submission.

- Course content should include multiple forms of effective writing, different writing styles, approaches and formats, and methods to adapt writing to different audiences, purposes and contexts. Students should learn to organize complex arguments in writing using thesis statements, claims and evidence, and to analyze writing for errors in logic.
- The University Writing Requirement (WR) ensures students both maintain their fluency in writing and use writing as a tool to facilitate learning. To receive Writing Requirement credit, a student must receive a grade of C or higher and a satisfactory completion of the writing component of the course. This means that written assignments must meet minimum word requirements totaling 6000 words.

## **General Education Learning Outcomes:**

At the end of this course, students will be expected to have achieved the following learning outcomes in content, communication and critical thinking:

- **Content**: Students demonstrate competence in the terminology, concepts, theories and methodologies used within the academic discipline.
- Communication: Students communicate knowledge, ideas and reasoning clearly and effectively in written and oral forms appropriate to the discipline. Students will participate in class discussions throughout the semester to reflect on assigned readings.
- **Critical Thinking:** Students analyze information carefully and logically from multiple perspectives, using discipline-specific methods, and develop reasoned solutions to problems.

#### **Assignments:**

- 2 Poem Analyses (1,000 words each; 100 points): These brief essays will respond to questions about one or more poetic devices and consider how they operate within an individual poem. Poems to be analyzed will come from our textbook (pgs. 279-477) or one of the three assigned collections. Additionally, you may use poems found on the Poetry Foundation website (www.poetryfoundation.org), as long as they do not also appear in Chaps. 1-14 of our textbook. Chapters 22-24 in our textbook will also serve as a valuable writing resource. Turned in via Canvas.
- 2 Close Reading Essays (2,000 words each; 200 points): These longer essays will consider how a broader range of poetic devices / themes operate across a group of poems by either the same or different authors. Poems to be analyzed will come from our textbook (pgs. 279-477) or one of the three assigned collections. Additionally, you may use poems found on the Poetry Foundation website (<a href="www.poetryfoundation.org">www.poetryfoundation.org</a>), as long as they do not also appear in Chaps. 1-14 of our textbook. Chapters 22-24 in our textbook will also serve as a valuable writing resource. Turned in via Canvas.

- 7 Poems (100 points each): You will compose poems based on prompts that I will provide. Poems will be evaluated based on seriousness of undertaking, adherence to prompt, and professionalism / polish (free of typos/grammatical errors), not on their success or failure as first drafts. You are encouraged to take risks and go where your writing leads you. Each poem will be turned in via hard copy in class and in Canvas.
- Final Portfolio (200 points): You will revise 5 poems of your choosing, taking into account my comments, your classmates' comments from workshop, and your own artistic aesthetics, judgment, and intuition. Turned in via Canvas.

Please note: I will provide more specific instructions for each of these (via Canvas + class) as they are assigned.

• Class Participation (100 points): You will earn class participation credit based on your preparedness for active and mindful participation in class discussions and workshops. This also will include a small number of in-class writing exercises.

- 6. Paper Format & Submission: All assignments should be typed in Times New Roman 12 pt font with standard margins. All assignments except poems should be double-spaced. (Spacing and line length of poems, of course, will be formatted according to the poet's decisions on aesthetics and form.) Submit all poems, whether to me or for workshop, on paper in class AND on Canvas. If your poem due for workshop, you will be responsible for bringing the specified number of copies. Submit all other assignments on Canvas as specified in each assignment's instructions. All analyses and close reading essays should be formatted according to MLA guidelines, a guide to which is available in our textbooks as well as online.
- 7. *Late Papers/Assignments*: Acceptance of late papers/assignments will be at my discretion and dependent on circumstances. **Here, as with absences, advance notice is key.**
- 8. *Paper Maintenance Responsibilities*. Keep duplicate copies of all work submitted in this course. Save all returned, graded work until the semester is over.

I expect you to come to class prepared for thorough, substantive, and engaged discussion for all meetings, and I will show you the same respect by being well-prepared, too.
