Course Description

This course gives you guidance and practice in two main areas:

- 1) writing expository essays, documents in which your main purpose is to convey some idea or information to readers. Such essays can contain many different features, but we will focus on three: *defining, comparing,* and *evaluating*. To guide your practice, we will study and apply basic issues in *prose style*.
- 2) assessing your own writing carefully, thoroughly, and accurately. The goal of this is to make you a conscious, self-reliant, and therefore stronger writer in the long run.

Note: This course can provide 6000 words toward the <u>UF Writing Requirement</u>, provided you earn a C or better.

Semester Overview

• We will read and discuss various examples of expository writing, and we will establish basic criteria for the *defining, comparing,* and *evaluating* essays.

January 21 and thereafter

- On Tuesdays (or Wednesdays) you will meet with me individually, for 15 minutes, to discuss your essays-in-progress and your finished essays.
- On Thursdays we will meet as a class to discuss specific issues of prose style.

Work Requirements

Nine expository essays.

- Almost any topic will be appropriate (except social media and the internet).
- Essays 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8 will be 800 words long, each.
- Essays 3, 6, 9 will be 1200 words long, each.
- Each essay will be due one week after the individual conference inwhich we discuss it.
- Regardless of length, each essay will be worth 10 points toward your final grade.

Nine revision statements.

- You will write these after our individual conference but before you turn in the final draft of each essay.
- They will explain how you plan to revise each essay, based on what we will have discussed at your individual conference.
- Each statement will be 50 words long.
- Each statement will be due 48 hours after your individual conference.
- Each statement will be worth 1 point toward your final grade.

Essay Grades	
0-5 E	You submitted no essay or an essay we did not discuss in conference.
6-6.9 D range	The essay <i>poorly</i> applies defining, comparing, or evaluating to its larger purpose, Its prose style is unclear; it <i>hinders</i> a reader's understanding, It contains at least <i>five</i> infelicities of grammar and/or usage.
7-7.9 C range	The essay <i>adequately</i> applies defining, comparing, or evaluating to its larger purpose, Its prose style is neutral; it <i>neither hinders nor helps</i> a reader's understanding, It contains <i>three or four</i> infelicities.
8-8.9 B range	The essay <i>skillfully</i> applies defining, comparing, or evaluating to its larger purpose, Its prose style is clear; it <i>helps a</i> reader's understanding, It contains <i>one or two</i> infelicities.
9-9.9 A range	The essay <i>masterfully</i> applies defining, comparing, or evaluating to its larger purpose, Its prose style is clear and graceful; it <i>delights</i> a reader, It contains <i>no</i> infelicities.
