This is an advanced composition course emphasizing argumentation and prose style. It will also show you how to evaluate your own writing thoroughly and carefully.

o Nine revision statements.

- · These explain how you plan to revise each essay.
- Each statement will be 50 words long.
- Each statement is due 48 hours before you submit the final version of an essay.
