## Course Objectives

This Honors Seminar will focus on two major twentieth-century advocates of radical humanism and democratic socialism, Erich Fromm and George Orwell, the former a psychoanalyst and social theorist, the latter a writer of novels and nonfictional prose. Their work will be considered both in its historical context and for its relevance to our own time. In the spirit of both Orwell and Fromm, emphasis will be placed on close reading, clear writing, and critical thinking. Weekly one-page response papers will provide opportunities for students to demonstrate skills sufficient to earn "clearance for take-off" to write the 15-20 page seminar paper.

## Course Requirements & Evaluation Criteria

Your course grade will be based on the following criteria: class participation (35%), response papers (15%), seminar paper (50%). I reserve the right to be more lenient if it seems warranted, but these percentages are the norm. There are no exams. Seminar papers must follow the guidelines of the Style Sheet. At least one week before the end of the semester, you must send me an email (not an attachment) with a proposal for your topic and setting forth your thesis. I will respond and tell you either to go ahead or ask for further clarification before you proceed. No outside sources may be used without being specified ahead of time and receiving my permission. Especially since this is an Honors Seminar, I expect regular attendance, and each absence over three may result in a lowering of your course grade by one-half a letter. Course books have been ordered at the UF Bookstore, and please use the editions I will specify in class.
