## Course Objectives

The course will focus on three books of *The Faerie Queene*, the Legends of Holiness, Chastitie, and Courtesie, as well as the Mutabilitie Cantos. We will consider theological, philosophical political, historical, and psychological dimensions of Spenser's epic, but the primary objective is to enhance students' appreciation of his literary art by cultivating skills of close reading and critical thinking. The two examinations and required term paper provide occasions for students to demonstrate analytic and writing skills commensurate with an upper-division English course.

# Course Requirements & Evaluation Criteria

Your course grade will be based on the following criteria: midterm (25%), final exam (25%), one five-page paper (40%), and class participation (10%). I reserve the right to be more lenient, but these percentages are the norm. The midterm and noncumulative final will be in three parts, consisting of a commentary on five short passages, a close reading of a longer passage, and an essay question on a choice of topics. Papers must follow the guidelines of the Style Sheet. At least one week before the papers are due, you must send me an email (not an attachment) with a one-paragraph proposal for your topic and setting forth your thesis. I will respond and tell you either to go ahead or ask for further clarification before you proceed. No outside sources may be used without being specified ahead of time and receiving my permission. Early papers will be returned with my comments and a grade, and may then be rewritten for a new grade. Each absence over five may result in a lowering of your course grade by one-half a letter. Copies of the required Penguin edition of The Faerie Queene have been ordered at the UF Bookstore or may be purchased online.
