## **ENL 6256: Class and the Victorian Novel**

Class identities as we understand them today came to exist, in large part, in the late eighteenth century and early Victorian period. It is a period obsessed both with the possibility of abolishing differences of caste and class and with the attempt to fix them as essential identity categories. This course will be an opportunity to think about class in the Victorian period, and earlier systems underlying and informing it. We will focus on the novel as the privileged literary locus of the elaboration of middle class subjectivity and also as a site wherein the role of class in a newly mobile, industrial and imperial society was explored. We will read a number of Victorian novels and other texts from the period, and will also spend time reading and thinking about works which interrogate and historicize our principal terms.

Full books should ideally be purchased; shorter readings will be available on library reserve, or Sakai, as indicated. Of the books we are reading in part, we are reading enough of the Bourdieu and Wahrman that you should own them if possible (Amazon and Abebooks are likely to have used copies). You may use any good, unabridged edition of the literary works that you like. Oxford or Penguin has many in paperback, and Broadview editions are generally quite good as well. You may also use electronic editions.

## Requirements:

Requirements include attendance and participation, six short (1-2 page) responses to the reading, one full length paper (21-25 pages) of which a half-length draft is due November 8th, and one turn preparing a discussion question for a week for which you will sign up in advance.

If you would like to tailor your final project for a particular purpose (dissertation chapter, for example), or for a program outside the English PhD (another department or CRW) please let me know.

Response papers are due each week to the class email list to be circulated and shared; you should post them at least 48 hours before class. (I will create an email list for the class, to which you may post papers, responses, questions, etc.) You may choose which six weeks you will turn something in, but please do not turn them in late. You need not comment on the entire reading-you may comment on any portion of it.

Attendance and preparation are required; you are professionals, and this is your work--I expect that most students miss no class. Acceptable reasons to miss are serious or contagious illness, presenting a paper at a conference, etc. Since each class is an entire week of the semester, students who miss two or more meetings for any reason should consult with me to consider whether withdrawal is appropriate. All required work must be completed in order to pass this course. Incomplètes should only be requested if a student, having completed most of the coursework, is unavoidably unable to finish on time due to illness or family emergency. Incomplètes granted for any other reason will result in a reduction in the final grade.

I base grading on multiple variables, and on individual effort and progress, as we have first year MAs and final year PhDs together, and colleagues in and out of field. Each of you will be seeking different things in the class, and that is as it should be. Although the only "graded" item in your coursework is the final paper, your course grade will not be determined solely by that; it will also be affected by participation, the overall quality of your response papers, etc.

Students are expected to provide feedback on the quality of instruction in this course based on 10 criteria. These evaluations are conducted online at <a href="https://evaluations.ufl.edu">https://evaluations.ufl.edu</a>. Evaluations are typically

open during the last two or three weeks of the semester, but students will be given specific times when they are open.
