**Description** According to the UF Undergraduate Catalog, this course will "explore the issues, questions and

themes raised in the rich literature, culture and theory that emerge as a response to and in

contestation of the experiences of the colonial and postcolonial worlds."

Specifically, this version of the course will examine the concept of coloniality through examples of

life writing.

Coloniality refers to the influence European ideas exert on formerly colonized nations, mostly to their detriment. Life writing refers to forms of non-fiction that describe all or part of an author's life.

Plan We will start by reading and discussing a handful of essays about coloniality and life writing, in

order to build a conceptual foundation. Then, we will read and discuss six books.
