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Description

This course theorizes rhetoric by examining rhetoric's relation to culture. If *rhetoric* refers broadly to various systems of symbol use, and if *culture* refers broadly to forms of social organization, then we might describe the relationship between *rhetoric* and *culture* as intimate and complex, because symbols help organize societies.

Objectives

To learn about *cultural rhetorics* as a concept/practice and as an emerging sub-field within writing studies. To examine how *cultural rhetorics* informs the study of writing, rhetorics, and literacies as such. To consider how *cultural rhetorics* might inform your emerging or ongoing research program.

Texts

We will read and discuss recent articles and books. All of the articles and most of the books will be freely available, either through the internet, <u>Canvas</u>, the UF Library <u>catalog</u>, or <u>Ares</u> (the library's course reserves system).
