REQUIREMENTS Three brief essays (5-7 pages), one on each canticle of the *Comedy*, plus quizzes to assess the reading. Your **GRADE** depends upon attendance (10%), participation (5%), quizzes (10%), and the essays (75%).

GOALS To introduce students to arguably the greatest poem of Medieval Europe and to enable them to appreciate the enormous influence it has had on English literature. No knowledge of Italian is required or expected; the course is taught in translation out of the conviction that some knowledge of the mighty poem is preferable to no knowledge of it at all.
